
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Waynesville, Missouri, county seat of Pulaski County, began the decade of the 1940s with a population of 468 citizens. The only paved street in the small village was Route 66 on the south side of the town square. There were no city utilities nor health services, except the local doctor. Then came the construction of Fort Leonard Wood. Before the decade was over, the rustic village was transformed into a modern Ozark town. This is the story of that transformation.


