Haven for Vacationist

Probably no Ozark setting offers more to the pleasure-seeker than Pippin Place, on the beautiful Gasconade. Here one may fish in the river and its sparkling tributaries, canoe over miles of winding streams, canter over historic trails, find solitude among the rugged hills or beside gurgling springs.

The main building of thirty rooms is of native cobblestone, situated on a plateau overlooking miles of river valley. It is equipped with all comfortable furnishings of the modern city home.

The Glorious Gasconade

What years ago was an oldfashioned grist mill is now a water-driven power plant to furnish electric current for Pippin Place.

Missouri has many beautiful streams, but none compares with the Gasconade for consistent good fishing, miles of scenic beauty, clearness, and absence of dangerous whirlpools, treacherous currents and quicksand.


The Gasconade is dear to the heart of many a seasoned fisherman and ardent nature-lover, not only from this state, but from many distant parts of the nation.

Many Springs

Fed by innumerable springs, it is the habitat for the gamy small-mouth black bass, and is of an invigorating temperature for swimmers.

Numerous towering bluffs come to the water's edge, and on gentle sloping banks great bullfrogs may be caught.


Picturesque Falling Spring is a favorite spot for picnics, camp fires, and outdoor feasts.






The Gasconade at Pippin's



Small Mouth Black Bass






Excellent Fishing

Fish in abundance inhabit the Gasconade River, Roubidoux Creek, Big Piney and Little Piney Rivers. Here the flyfisherman may drop his favorite lure in a likely spot, and, if a small-mouth black bass chooses to take it, a battle royal will ensue.

Other game fish in large numbers are rock bass, sun perch, goggle-eye perch and crappie. These fish are not too wary to take a minnow, which can be trapped or seined. Channel cat, strong fighters, also may be had.

Indian Lookout is a high bluff from which the redskins watched upstream for friend or foe. Today it affords a striking vantage point for a view of the river and surrounding country.



Four scenic and fishing floats of about twenty miles each may be taken from Pippin Place.

The Safe Gasconade

Guests at Pippin Place enjoy a wide variety of sports in the cool, clear Gasconade. Young or old, few guests are able to withstand its lure.

Rowboats for fishing and for scenic water trips are always available.

A large spring-fed swimming hole, clear and cool, affords ample room for the strongest swimmer. It is only a few paces from the hotel.

Safe Wading

Wading for children and those unable to swim is safe on the gradually sloping natural sand and gravel beach. Due to the clearness of the water, the gravel bottom usually can be seen at a depth of four to six feet.

It is easy to find fine stretches of water for wading or swimming, at whatever depth is desired. Here, too, on the sandy beach merry parties are held and many a song and story is heard.

The Gasconade at Pippin Place is safe and affords all the fishing and water sports of other streams not so richly endowed.





Many a snappy match is played on the clay tennis court. Guests of both sexes vie with each other at horseshoe pitching.

Hiking is always popular. Parties of two or more strike out confidently to reach a distant hill-top, cave or spring, and flower lovers are rewarded by countless blooms of wild plum, cherry, hawthorn, dogwood, crabapple, redbud, verbenas, sweet William, violets, bluebells, foxglove, columbine, scarlet sage, tulips, daisies and others, each in its season.

Horseback Riding

Good saddle mounts from Pippin stables are ready to take guests over winding Ozark trails which unfold a seemingly endless series of beautiful spectacles of Nature's handiwork in form and color. A gentle pony is a favorite mount for small children.

Then, too, are the cool, spacious living rooms, recreation hall and shady porches and lawns for quiet games of cards, or plain loafing.

April to December

Pippin Place guests refuse to hibernate in the city after Labor Day, and many venture out before the buds in springtime. Thus, Pippin Place is not a mere summer resort; it is practically a year 'round hotel, open from April 1 to December 1.

There's fun and rest to be had here in early Spring and late Fall. Here Nature may be seen unfolding herself in April and May, and preparing for a winter of slumber in a blaze of color in October and November, when the multicolored hills seem still more colorful on a hike or nut and persimmon hunt.

Autumn Parties

And on crisp Fall evenings, by the spacious fireplaces, spinning of yarns, relating fishing experiences, roasting of apples and a feast of native nuts make many an evening all too short. Gala Hallowe'en and Thanksgiving parties are yearly events.

The Pippins

Pippin Place is headed by Dr. B. N. Pippin of St. Louis.

Born ten miles from Pippin Place, Dr. Pippin learned to love the spot on which the hotel now stands and the old grist mill where he, as a mere lad, brought grain to be ground into meal and flour.

Pippin Place was established in 1915 and three years later the capacity was more than doubled. Each year improvements are made to provide added comforts for guests.

Mrs. B. N. Pippin pioneered the hotel with the doctor, and until recently was active in its management.

Dru L. Pippin

Dru L. Pippin, vice-president and general manager, is a graduate of the University of Missouri College of Agriculture. He has acted as county agricultural agent in North Missouri and now conducts the Pippin 500-acre model farm.

A herd of thirty registered Jersey cattle, many sheep, pure-bred chickens and hogs, are under his supervision, as is the scientific preparation of dairy products and the raising of a wide variety of choice vegetables and fruits for Pippin Place table.

For several years she was a member of the Extension Division of the University of Missouri (under auspices of the U. S. Department of Agriculture), giving lecture-demonstrations in Missouri towns on the subjects of food planning, food preparation and child feeding.

She is a gracious hostess and expert dietitian. Her carefully planned meals and Southern hospitality are a delight, as is the quiet efficiency with which she supervises the details of providing a high-grade dining and guest room service to Pippin Place guests.



Rates

Rates include room and meals. They are based on location of room, with two adults occupying each room.

Double beds upstairs; twin beds downstairs.

Hot and cold running water at all times.

Upstairs rooms with accessible bath, \$3.50 each person a day; by week, \$21.00 each person.

Downstairs rooms with accessible bath, \$4.00 each person a day; \$24.00 by week.

Downstairs rooms with accessible bath, running water in room, \$5.00 each person a day; \$30.00 by week.

Downstairs rooms with private bath, \$6.00 each person a day; \$35.00 each by the week.

There is an extra charge for one person occupying room alone when shortage of rooms exists.

Half rates for children under ten years occupying rooms with parents or guardians.

Monthly rates on application.

Rates for house parties and conventions on application.

Boats, 50c a day; \$3.00 a week (on floats, 75c a day). Nominal charge for hauls. Guides procured on request.

Saddle horses: Half day, \$2.00; \$1.00 by hour; \$12.00 by week.
